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

#### **Old Business**

The Grotto Constitution and Bylaws, Membership Application and Conservation Statement have been updated and will be sent to Grotto members for comment and suggestions. We will revise the maps in the 2015 Medicine Lake campout guide for the August campout. A draft of the guide, without cave or campsite locations, will be prepared for grottos that might have members wanting to come. (The changes are needed because the document will be in pdf format and may circulate without SAG oversight.) There will be additional materials for hand-distribution to persons coming to the campout.

#### **Trip Reports:**

June 23-24 Bill Broeckel, Colby Collins, Steve Hobson, Dave Smith and Jim and Liz Wolff checked out several caves in the Hat Creek area that Tom Rickman had found. They surveyed 2 of the caves, noted that bats were no longer in one, but located them (or different bats) in another cave that didn't have any on Tom's visit. A few other (very small) caves were found. The first of the two caves surveyed (The Hat Trick, Man) is 633 ft., the second, surveyed Sunday, is 299.4 ft.

Over the July 4<sup>th</sup> weekend Liz and Breanna Kisling finished surveying the far north end of Maze Cave, and Bruce Rogers did a mineral survey in the upper part of the cave. Liz and Breanna found slime bubbles in the crawl section of the cave, but avoided getting wet. The surveys showed that the old map was misaligned. The last shot in the old map had a 90 deg. error.

The caves offered included the Crater Ice Cave Complex, the Papoose Complex, the Freudian Complex, the Powder Complex, the Roadside Complex (got a complex yet?) and a side trip down to Three Level Ice Cave. A bit of excitement was created by Ginger Sanders who created some glass marbles (she's a nationally renowned glass blower) with cave views inside them. She brought five and hid them around the camp area for anyone to find. The finders could keep their marbles. Thank you Ginger for the Great Marble Hunt!


The first trip of Saturday was by Don and David out to Big Glass Mtn, an interesting area of pumice and obsidian (volcanic glass). They were then joined by Doug & Tabitha and Angela for a vertical and rigging practice on a short drop beside the Arch in the Roadside Complex.

One trip was guided out to the Freudian Complex. Dave led Rick, Jeff, Louisa, Melanie, Jim, and Scott into the cave at shiner 4, out downstream of shiner 6 to the Double Barrel entrance at shiner 11. On the return they re-traversed from shiners 11 to 6 and then up to the Air Passage and crawled or stoop-walked their way back to the surface in the Ant Farm. They saw around 1½ miles of cave on the trip. Several small wildlife were noted, among them a rosy boa on the wall of the cave.

Steve led a trip with Brent, Tom and Ginger & Logan to the Roadside Complex. While they were there Brent got a good shot of a rappeller practicing near the Arch. Roadside was as photogenic as usual, but short. After lunch Steve led his group to Three Level Ice Cave. Later in the afternoon they hiked all over the lava searching for the main entrance to Bobcat Cave. They found lots of holes, led astray by Steve's GPS unit, but didn't find the sought-after main entrance. They finally gave up and entered the Hunter's entrance to the cave, not realizing where they were: walking, climbing, then crawling and slithering their way to the main cave near the main entrance. They then spent some time searching for the tiny entrance to Rooty-Tooty Cave, and retreated to camp to drown their failure in liquid refreshments. And to start looking for their marbles ...

An evening trek out to Papoose was made by Mark, Jeff, Don, David, Doug, Tabitha, and Angela who all returned in time to be buzzed by Brent's drone taking aerial pictures of the camp area. After watching the short life of drone batteries another impromptu vertical class was held. Dean wanted to learn to climb so one of Steve's ropes was strung up in a large cedar. Angela and committee got him climbing and down-climbing. Scott demonstrated a neat little gizmo that can be used as a climbing device and also used as a point capture if used in rescue work. Small and light-weight, we marveled at the size to weight ratio and how easy it was to manipulate.

Sunday dawned to a slow moving camp. A few had to leave early, but most of the rest chose to hike out to Rooty-Tooty Cave in the Powder Complex while a small group broke down the His'n & Her'n and policed the campsite.



#### 2) Were you able to find the camp easily?

Signs were great. Flagging at the road could easily be confused with any other flagging. Perhaps a discrete sign at the road? Bat sticker? NSS sign? – David

#### 4) What did you like about the camp area?

Room for everyone, far from the pavement, shade. - Brent

It was close to a lot of caves and having the papoose complex right outside of camp was perfect for afternoon caving. – Jeff

- 1. Shade
- 2. Weather, not too hot

- Twas nice (not essential) to stroll to a super cave and stroll right back to camp. Doug

Camp area is fine. – Rick

Lots of places to camp in a car, more difficult in a tent. But hey, it's a lava flow. Toilet was nice although my system didn't cooperate. – Scott

It was easy to set up our tent and the caves were very close. I loved the caves. There was a toilet. Trees are okay unless you need to "take the Browns to the Superbowl." Bees and wasps and ants. Except I liked the bald faced hornet. Especially when it ate the wasps. – Logan

#### 5) What didn't you like about it?

No complaints. - Tom

The ground is a little rough compared to other camps with more dirt. But that's a minor pick since you asked! – Brent

Nothing we could do much about:

My only annoyance was the smoke.

The insects were sometimes challenging but at least there were no (or nearly no) mosquitoes nor other "dietary biteys." – Doug

The yellowjackets aren't much fun but that's summer in the forest. – Rick

#### 6) Were the cave maps adequate for the caves you visited?

I never really looked at them since went with groups and leaders who had visited them before. - Tom

Since the list of waypoints weren't accurate, we used the maps to try and figure out where the entrances were. The large scale of the Bobcat Cave area made seeing detail difficult. We couldn't seem to line up the trench systems with the map. I don't know how you would improve that since there are so many caves out there that cover large expanses of land. You would need a book full of maps to show detail and that isn't practical. I would have liked to have had the tree skylight in Bobcat Cave named on the map as that was the only feature I was sure of at the time Steve and I were trying to figure out where we were. — Brent

I had no trouble finding the camp and I didn't have any problem finding the caves either. – Jeff

Yes, absolutely. Wonderful! Kudos. - Doug

Kind of. I like that I have them to put on my wall. My mom will frame Bobcat for me because I did almost the whole thing. – Logan

#### 7) Were you able to find the caves on self-guided trips?

Did not go to any by myself. - Tom

When we had a trip leader that had been there before, yes. - Brent

I did use the GPS cord's to find Santana Cave but found it too daunting. Want someone to guide me to the correct entrance. – Rick

The maps were great and the GPS points that I used worked perfectly. – Jeff

#### 8) What could we do to improve the whole thing if we decide to do this again?

I think it would be better to have half a dozen or so trips available chosen ahead of time with leaders prearranged and with signup sheets and a brief description and or photo of the cave. If some of the trips don't generate interest, go with the ones that had sign ups. Part of the problem I saw here and other joint cave trips I have been to, is that folks that are new to the area have that confused look on their faces and don't know enough about the different caves to make a good choice. I like that fact there were so many different systems and directions you offered. – Brent

I can't think of anything to improve on. I really appreciate everyone taking the time to make this event happen. – Jeff

Do it more. - Logan


